Biography/Historical Note

Barbara Greenough was born in Tisbury, Massachusetts on August 19, 1913, to Henry Vose Greenough (1885-1976), a textile executive, and Emery Holden, whose family owned the Cleveland, Ohio newspaper *The Plain Dealer*. She had two brothers Henry Vose Greenough, Jr. (1912-1976), an acoustical engineer, and Peter B. Greenough (1917-2006), a newspaper editor and financial columnist who married opera singer Beverly Sills. Barbara was a society debutante at age 17. On October 22, 1932, at 19 years old, Barbara married John Freeman Bradley. The couple had two daughters, Anne, known as Nan, and Emery, called Ummy, by the family. Barbara lived in the greater Boston area and spent her last years in Wellesley, Massachusetts. She was a member of the Cleaveland House Poets, a group of poets that met biweekly in West Tisbury, Massachusetts. Barbara's poems were published in the *Boston Globe* and the *Vineyard Gazette*, and she contributed to 3 books of poetry. By the early 1970s Barbara realized that she had a problem with alcohol and joined Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). AA was a major part of her life into the 1980s.

Barbara Greenough Bradley's family had a long history as summer residents of Tisbury, Massachusetts. Barbara's grandfather, Charles Greenough, was one of the first homeowners on West Chop, building his house for the summer of 1890. Barbara's father, Henry Vose Greenough, and mother, Emery Holden, bought their cottage, "Chopsticks", on West Chop in 1912. "Chopsticks" was the family's summer residence until it was sold in 1970. After her family home on West Chop was sold Barbara spent time in Makonikey at the home of her partner Justine Ruiz de Conde.

Scope and Content of Collection

Barbara Greenough Bradley kept journals and diaries throughout much of her life. This collection includes 9 of these diaries which Barbara wrote between the ages 62-76. An entry in January of 1984 reflects, "I did originally start writing them in later years to give a picture of the life of an ageing woman – a lesbian grandmother, a sometime poet and painter – in the late 20th century." She frequently inserted articles, cards, and pictures between the pages. The inserts include: newspaper clippings of current events, poetry, and obituaries of family and friends; greeting cards from Christmas, Valentine's Day, birthdays, and anniversaries; programs for museums and theater productions; and photographs of her dog and friends. The letters in the final folder between Barbara and Arthur Railton of the Dukes County Historical Society discuss her desire to donate her diaries to the Society.
